My grocery bill is higher then the average. Chickens do not lay more then 1 egg per day. For each person in my home to have an egg a day, I would need a minimum of 6 chickens. To save money I bake everything I can from scratch, which would require more eggs. My property is under 1 acre and a large section of the backyard is gardens for food (front gardens are flowers, and we're working on making it all native plants). We would have the standard 5 chickens, plus a permit for 5 more. With having a larger number of chickens I would expect an annual inspection (more if complaints come in).
